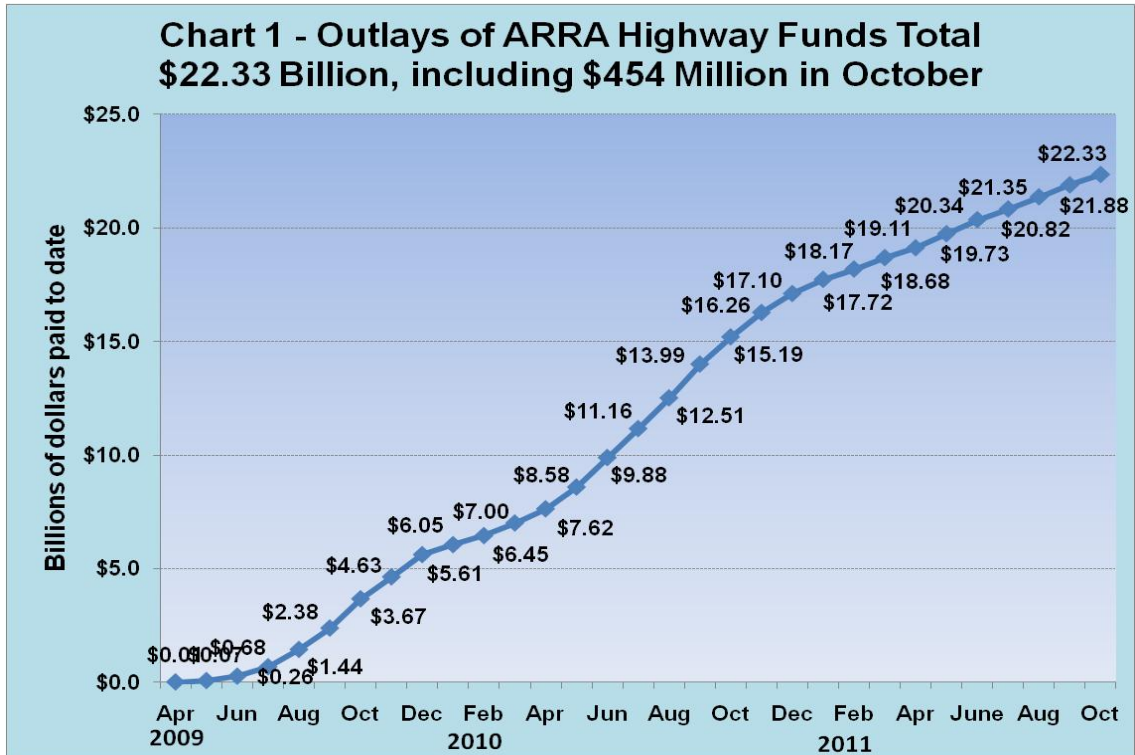

RE: UPDATE ON OBLIGATION OF ARRA HIGHWAY FUNDS

The attached charts and tables provide an update on the obligation and expenditure of American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA) highway funds as of October 31, 2011, based on data provided to ARTBA by the Federal Highway Administration (FHWA):

Outlays of ARRA Highway and TIGER Grant Funds

- During October, the FHWA outlayed \$454.4 million of ARRA funds, which is about 38 percent of the \$1.19 billion outlayed during October 2010. Year-to-date through October 31, ARRA outlays total \$5.24 billion, which is down 41.8 percent from the comparable part of 2010. Most outlays reimburse state and local governments for payments to contractors for work performed on ARRA-financed highway and bridge projects. The reduction in the outlay rate means ARRA highway funds are on track to support about 140,000 fewer jobs throughout the economy this year than during 2010.
- Since the Recovery Act was enacted in February 2009, \$22.33 billion of ARRA highway and Tiger Grant funds have been paid out in outlays by the FHWA (see Figure 1). This represents 82.5 percent of the \$27.08 billion of ARRA highway and TIGER grant funds obligated for highway improvements. See Table 2 for state by state outlays.
- The \$22.33 billion of ARRA outlays to date include \$5.61 billion paid out during calendar 2009, \$11.48 billion during calendar 2010 and \$5.24 billion so far during calendar 2011 (see Table 2 for state details). As of October 31, only \$4.75 billion of ARRA highway and TIGER grant funds remain to be paid out.
- With 2 months left in calendar 2011, it now appears outlays of ARRA highway funds will total just about \$5.9 billion this year or just about half the 2010 total. That would leave just \$4.0 billion of ARRA funds to support highway construction during 2012 and after.



- As of October 31, state and local governments in California continue to lead in outlays, at \$1.87 billion, with Texas second at \$1.76 billion and Florida third with outlays of \$975.0 million. Twelve other states have paid out more than \$500 million—Georgia, Illinois, Indiana, Michigan, Missouri, New Jersey (new this month), New York, North Carolina, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Tennessee and Wisconsin.
- Wyoming has paid out 99.8 percent of its ARRA highway funds, which continues to be the most of any state. South Dakota follows at 99.2 percent, then Utah at 98.7 percent, Alaska and Vermont at 98.5 percent and Iowa at 98.3 percent. Other states above 95 percent include Colorado (95.1%), Maine (95.7%), Mississippi (97.8%), Montana (97.6%), New Hampshire (97.7%), North Dakota (97.8%) and West Virginia (96.4%). The only state below 50 percent is Hawaii at 45.3 percent. Calculations include Tiger Grant funds.

Awards and Obligations

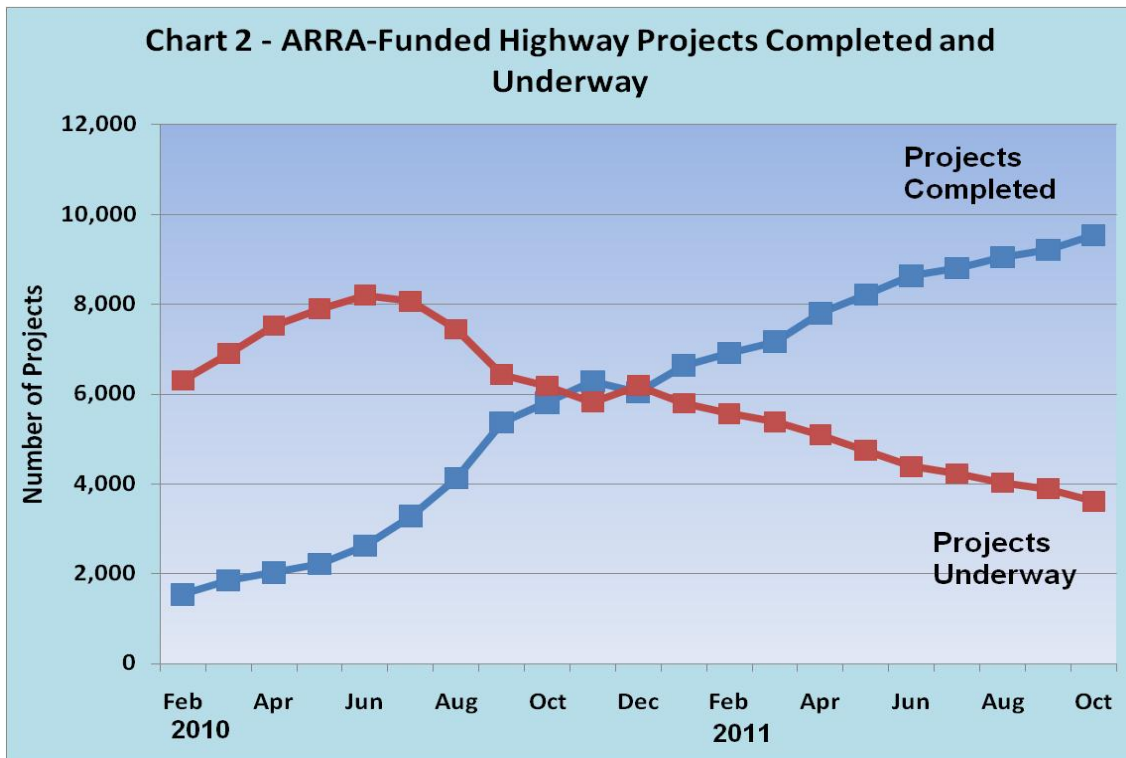
- The deadline for obligating ARRA highway improvement funds for projects was September 30, 2010. After that, no new projects could be added. Funds can still be shifted among projects but if a state applies to increase the amount obligated for a project, FHWA can approve or disapprove the increase although adjustments cannot exceed the total amount of Recovery Act funds apportioned to the state. Table 1 shows that a handful of states have a total of \$54.4 million of

unobligated balances as of October 31, including unobligated TIGER Grant funds.

- The data in Tables 1 and 2 include funding for TIGER 1 grants as well as for ARRA highway program projects. The total amount of TIGER 1 grants awarded as of October 14—the latest date for which FHWA has provided details—is \$810.2 million, of which \$805.8 million has been obligated and \$676.9 million involves projects for which construction is underway. Details are in Table 3.
- The ARRA permitted recipients to obligate highway funds for non-highway improvements. A total of twenty-eight states flexed \$443.0 million to transit projects and \$85.7 million to freight rail, passenger rail or port infrastructure projects. The total represents 1.94 percent of ARRA highway funds. State-by-state details are in Table 1.

Projects Completed and Underway

- As of October 28, 9,538 ARRA-funded projects had been completed, representing 71.3 percent of all Recovery Act projects, and the number is climbing as Chart 2 shows. The number of projects underway is falling, from a peak of more than 8,000 projects in June 2010 to 3,613 projects as of October 28.



Summary

- The table below provides the latest summary of ARRA highway funding¹. State and local government recipients obligated just over \$26.3 billion of ARRA highway funds for 12,924 projects, including 9,398 that have been completed and 3,421 that are under construction. When projects on federal lands and TIGER 1 projects are included, the grand total comes to \$27.6 billion obligated for 13,381 projects.
